Benefits Beyond Affordability

As one of 1,500 U.S. affiliates of Habitat for Humanity International, Habitat for Humanity of Greater Centre County (HFHGCC) works locally to bring generous donors and hardworking volunteers together with qualified, working families to build homes and hope. The result is dramatic, positive differences in the lives of our partner family members community. in our The and organization constructs quality houses that are sold to homebuyer families through no-profit, no-interest loans. Homebuyers complete 350 sweat-equity hours and other requirements, pay for their homes and all upkeep, and maintain current payments on their properties. To date, HFHGCC has built, renovated or repaired more than 60 homes.

In 2015, we intend to rehab two more homes for two soon-to-be qualified families, as well as continue to expand our homeowner education opportunities for our partner families.

As you know, Centre County and the surrounding region continues to suffer from a lack of affordable housing options all along the housing need continuum. From night shelters to short-term transitional options to subsidized rental programs to lower cost purchase opportunities, each area continues to see cutbacks while also facing a growing demand.

Habitat for Humanity is often the only opportunity for families looking to achieve their dreams of homeowership. In addition to establishing roots and building equity, Habitat partner families also benefit in the following ways:

• No interest mortgage - Saves an average of about \$90,000 over the life of the loan

• Low monthly payments - Currently, most new homeowners pay less than \$600 per month

• Low good faith deposit - Partner families pay only \$500 for their down payment

And the benefits don't end with affordability.

Homeownership Builds Successful Children. Compared to children of renters (of the same age, income, race, etc.), children of homeowners are 25% more likely to graduate from high school, 116% more likely to graduate from college, and 20% less likely to become teenage mothers.

Homeownership Builds Stronger Communities. Compared to renters (of the same age, income, race, etc.), homeowners are: 28% more likely to repair or improve their homes, 12% more likely to maintain a garden outside their homes, and 15% more likely to vote.

Homeownership Builds Stronger Families. Compared to renters (of the same age, income, race, etc.), homeowners are: 10% more likely to attend church, 16% more likely to belong to parent-teacher organizations, block clubs, and are less likely to have alcohol and substance-abuse problems.

ReStore Round-up

HFHGCC's ReStore is a retail outlet, selling deeply discounted home improvement items and building materials and supplies. Everything in the ReStore is donated so we can sell it at a fraction of the retail price. We partner with businesses and individuals to get the highest quality merchandise possible, and we also rely on volunteers to help us out so that we can keep our costs as low as possible.

100% of the ReStore profits go to HFHGCC to help fulfill its mission of providing quality homes to deserving, working families. An added benefit is that many of the items we sell would otherwise end up in the garbage. In 2014, the ReStore diverted approximately 175 tons (*that's 350,000 pounds*!!) of goods from local landfills. We provide businesses and individuals an opportunity to repurpose items they no longer need, while offering a tax benefit for contributing to a qualified 501(c) 3 organization.

ReStore Volunteer Opportunities

HFHGCC relies on several volunteers - many with unique skillsets - to support day-to-day ReStore operations.

Customer Support - Are you a people person? Love quality cusotmer service? We are always in need of folks interested in helping to make the ReStore experience an outstanding one.

Display & Design - Have a hankering for store design? Want to help set our stage to maximize sales? We're looking for a volunteer specifically to help style our store by setting up regular merchandise displays.

Processing & Pricing - Familiar with building materials? Have general knowledge of fair market prices for home improvement items? Help the ReStore by volunteering to process and price donations to ensure an adequate supply of sellable items on the sales floor.

Small Repair - Like to tinker? Can you fix anything? While we ask that all donations be in good, working order, there are times when we get merchandise that might need a little love. Appliances, cabinets, tools and more.

Donation Pick-ups - Feel like getting out and about? Have a knack for moving stuff? ReStore uses volunteers to help staff with donation pick-ups.

Cars for Homes[™]

Do you have an old or unneeded car, truck, boat or other vehicle sitting in your driveway, or taking up space in your garage? Consider donating it to Habitat for Humanity through Cars for Homes. Not only will you be helping Habitat provide decent, affordable housing, you might be helping the environment as well.

Why should you donate your car?

- One hundred percent of the net proceeds from the sale of your donated vehicle will be used by your local Habitat affiliate to build and repair affordable homes.
- You may qualify for a tax deduction for donating a vehicle.
- Thirty percent of cars donated to Habitat are recycled for materials or sold for reusable parts.
- Recycling steel uses less energy and natural resources and produces less carbon pollution.

How do I start the vehicle donation process?

- Call **Cars for Homes toll-free at (877) 277-4344** to arrange to donate your car, truck, motorcycle, recreational vehicle, snowmobile, farm equipment, construction equipment, boat, or airplane.
- You will be asked to provide information about the vehicle you wish to donate, including the make, model, vehicle identification number (VIN) and current mileage.
- Most vehicles with proper title information are accepted, unless the costs of processing and towing fees exceed the auction value of the vehicle.
